

M-11 - NORTHEAST CORNER SECTION 36, T3N, R5E, OCEOLA TOWNSHIP SUMMARY:

We found two 1/2" iron rods 8.2 feet apart, both appearing to be intended to represent the Northeast Corner of Section 36, Oceola intended to represent the Northeast Corner of Section 36, Oceola Township. The northerly iron is approximately 6 feet north of the centerline of a gravel road intersection, the southerly iron falls approximately 2 feet east and 1 foot south of the intersection. Kostecke in 1973 and Garlock in 1985 found and used an iron rod at the location of M-11 which, from their witnesses and relative location, appears to be the Northerly of the two irons (surveys attached). At that time, a second iron was not mentioned as having been found. In 1987 Garlock performed a survey (survey and field notes attached) in which the second iron is first noted but not used: "Found old 1/2" Iron Rod - 2nd Sec Cor?". Garlock recorded "Found old 1/2" Iron Rod - 2nd Sec Cor?". Garlock recorded an Act 74 after this survey (attached) on the Northerly of the two irons, tying in the 2nd iron. A subsequent survey by Desine 1990 (attached) used the Northerly iron. In Benton's witness records, both irons are noted and witnessed, but neither is called out as (attached) used the Northerly iron. In Benton's witness records, both irons are noted and witnessed, but neither is called out as the correct corner location. In summary, all known surveys since 1973 by Kostecke, Garlock and Desine have been tied to the Northerly of the two irons. In 1875 Bullock noted in the notes of his Survey of Section 36, (County Surveyor's Survey No.46, attached): "East Quarter Post lost. Established according to distances given by Adams, it agreeing with the fences and lines. from SE cor to E 1/4 Post 39.24 chs by Adams now 39.26 chs. from E 1/4 Post to NE cor 39.94 by Adams now 39.96 chs." Using today's measure and prorating against Bullock's 1875 chain, the distances from SE cor to E 1/4 cor and from E 1/4 cor to the Southerly of the two irons at the NE cor measure within 0.11 ft of perfect proration. A comparison of the GLO falling and today's measurement from the two irons to the alleged closing corner from Section 31 Hartland Twp. does not strongly support either corner location. Looking at measurements to the North from the two irons, along the East line of Section 25, note that the distance from the E 1/4 cor of Section 25 are within 0.03 of being equal, though approximately 7 ft off the line connecting the two East 1/4 corners. Excavation of the immediate area found no other corner evidence and no additional irons. An examination of 1/8th line occupation did not strongly favor either corner location. Due to the volume of surveys that have been performed, based on the northerly iron, and the fact that there is not irrefutable evidence to support either corner location.
